Michael Goebel will be Professor of Latin American and Global History at the Freie Universität Berlin

Appointment promises closer integration between Latin American history and histories of other world regions in the Berlin-Brandenburg area.


The Institute of Latin American Studies and the <u>Friedrich-Meinecke-Institut</u> are pleased to announce that from June 1, 2015, <u>Michael Goebel</u> will take up a <u>Dahlem International Network Professorship</u> in <u>Latin American</u> and <u>Global History</u>. Given his international track record in research and teaching as well as his historical interests combining the history of Latin America with that of other world regions, Goebel's appointment contributes both to an ever closer integration of area studies in the Berlin-Brandenburg area and to the Freie Universität's strategic goal of internationalization.

Michael Goebel has a Ph.D. from <u>University College London</u> (2006) and has since held research fellowships at the <u>Institute of Historical Research</u>, London, the <u>European University Institute</u>, and <u>Harvard University</u>. He has been awarded numerous research grants, among them the prestigious <u>Marie Curie Career Integration Grant</u> for his latest research project.

Its major findings will be published in his monograph by the <u>Cambridge</u> <u>University Press</u> in July 2015, entitled <u>Anti-Imperial Metropolis: Interwar Paris</u> and the Seeds of Third World Nationalism.

His previous publications include <u>Argentina's Partisan Past: Nationalism and</u> <u>the Politics of History</u> (Liverpool University Press, 2011) and articles in journals such as <u>Past and Present</u> and <u>Geschichte und Gesellschaft</u>. He is also editor, with Nicola Foote, of <u>Immigration and National Identities in Latin</u> <u>America</u> (University Press of Florida, 2014).

Michael Goebel's main research interests are the history of nationalism, of migration, and of cities in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. It is in these areas where he will teach at the Freie Universität Berlin, for both the <u>M.A. in</u> <u>Interdisciplinary Latin American Studies</u> and the <u>M.A. Global History</u>.
