

## PHD IN POLITICS AND INTERNATIONAL STUDIES University of Hull

The degree is obtained by the successful completion of a thesis on an approved topic, incorporating the results of independent research and scholarship and advancing knowledge in the discipline.

## ORGANISATION:

PhD students are allocated two supervisors, one of which will act as principal supervisor. Students must attend at least 12 formal supervision sessions with their supervisor every year. Students are encouraged to establish contact with other members of staff and to attend research seminars and other relevant postgraduate events held in the School, Faculty and University.

All research students (full-time and part-time) registered for a PhD are required to acquire during their period of study a minimum of 60 credits from the Postgraduate Training Scheme which will qualify them for the award of the Postgraduate Certificate in Research Training. Students should note that the submission of their thesis is not permitted until they have accumulated sufficient research training credits.

PhD students are usually offered the opportunity to gain teaching experience. Financial support is also available to present their research at conferences nationally and internationally.

The School of Politics, Philosophy and International Studies' Postgraduate Research Centre (PRC) was opened on 1 September 2010. It provides various facilities (computers, storage, common room, etc.) for the exclusive use of the School's doctoral, postdoctoral and visiting scholars. PhD students also have the opportunity to participate in the activities of a number of Research Centres linked to the School.

## **RESEARCH LINES:**

Research in Politics and International Studies at Hull covers a wide spectrum from political science, political theory/philosophy, political economy, comparative politics, security and strategic studies and international relations.
